10 Edw. VII. and 1 Geo. V., cap. 11, sec. 3 and 7.
The governor, master, or chief resident-officer of every prison, workhouse, barracks, hospital, or lunatic asylum, or every public or charitable institution which may be determined upon by the Lord Lieutenant, shall cause to be made a return of the inmates thereof, and shall conform to such instructions as may be sent to him by the authority of the Commission for the Management of Prisons, in relation to the returns required by this Act, so far as may be practicable, with respect to any such return.
Sec. 7 (3).—If any person employed in taking the Census communicates, without lawful authority any information acquired in the course of his employment he shall be liable to a fine of official trust within the meaning of the Official Secrets Act, 1889, and that Act shall apply accordingly.
